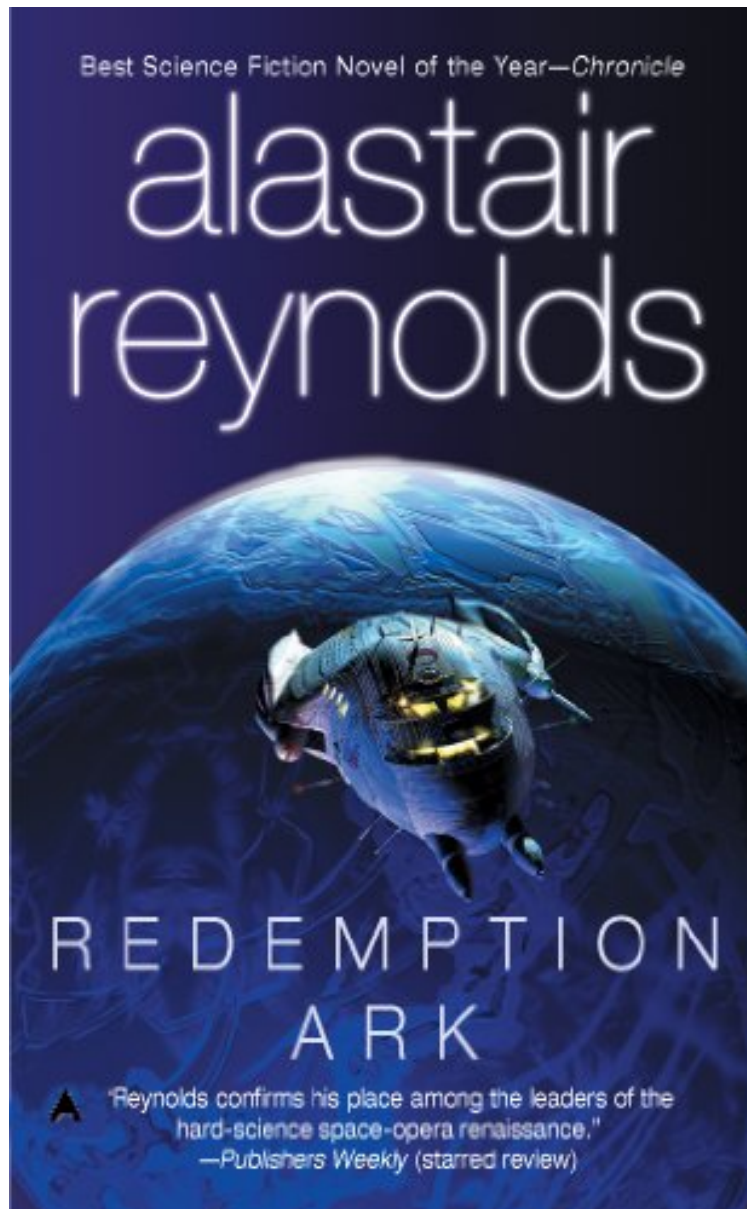

Diese "minor glitches" sind teilweise schon schmerzhaft. Die Personen handeln in einer Art und Weise, die für mich nicht nachvollziehbar ist. Die Charaktere werden sehr kurz aufgebaut und im Verlauf der Handlung benehmen sie sich dann total "daneben". Für das altruistische Verhalten von bspw. Scorpio und Ilia fehlt mir persönlich irgendein Motiv. Für den Verlauf des Erkundungsfluges in den Gasplaneten fehlen mir echt immer noch die Worte. Das war schon ungewollt sehr komisch. Die Armee der Schweine (sic) und ihr Anführer sind ein weiterer Lacher. Einzig Clavain wird einigermaßen glaubwürdig entwickelt, das ist einfach zu wenig. Konnte man bei den ersten beiden Bchern noch sagen, dass man diese lesen kann, ohne dabei an eine Fortsetzung zu denken, trifft dies auf "Redemption Ark" nicht mehr zu. Das Buch steht auf den Fundamenten der ersten beiden, spielen doch bekannte Charaktere aus dem ersten wie auch aus dem zweiten Buch wieder eine wichtige Rolle. Man trifft aber auch auf einige neue Charaktere, welche Reynolds perfekt in die bestehende Geschichte integriert. One either enjoys Alistair Reynolds' complex and often indulgent space operas, or simply doesn't. I do. His works are beyond the tight-packed novella and take in a broad amount of themes from various points of view. And it hangs together well. Unlimatey, a book should hold your interest and amuse, broaden your horizons and not be predictable. Reynolds accomplishes this with ease, as he simply seems to have no interest in stereotypes (mostly), giving his characters space to move, develop and change their minds.
